INFORMATION ON SOCIAL SECURITY BENEFITS AND PENSIONS AVAILABLE TO ABORIGINALS



### Publications in Aboriginal Languages

Some time ago you asked our Registrar in Parwin to consider producing Social Security Information in Aberiginal languages.

- We agree that this should be done and would like to co-eperate in the project in any may we can. 'e will be guided by your hepartment in the languages to be used and the method of producing the information.
- While we feel publications would be useful, you may feel that the information would be of more use to many aboriginal people if it could be prepared in their own languages in forms suitable for use on radio or on tape recorders. In this way suitable for use on radio or on tape recorders. In this way it may be possible to reach people who are not literate in either English or their Aberigisal Language. The effectiveness of this approach would depend, of course, on the availability of wireless and tape recorders to the people we would be trying to reach. If these are not readily available, perhaps consideration could be given to a project to distribute these devices, as has been done with radios in Papua New Cuinea.
- 4. We appreciate that these comments are outside to of this Department's responsibilities and pass them on as We appreciate that these comments are outside the scope suggestions only, and to emphasise that we will be happy to co-operate in any may we can to ensure that the boriginal people know and understand their social security entitlements.

Dear Laurie,

As you know our Departments have been and continue to be linked with others looking at the problems of implementing arrangements for payment of unemployment benefit to Aboriginals on reserves.

My officers in the Northern Territory feel that, whilst this is necessary to ensure that Aboriginals have the same access to benefits available to other Australians, there are other fields which require attention.

In the past we have relied on the work of officers of our own Department and Mission authorities to provide an agency service for your Department. In pastoral property areas we have tended to rely on the good graces of pastoralists and occasional visits from Departmental officers to see that Aboriginals receive their entitlements. I do not believe that this is good enough. I understand that at one time you were contemplating the development of extension officers which would include Aboriginals to work in the field to ensure that Aboriginals become aware of the basis on which they could submit claims. Could you tell me how far this has developed and whether you intend to launch such a scheme nationally?

I notice the advertisements in the newspapers recently in which you have drawn to the attention of the public the benefits which are available. I wonder if there are any additional special measures which might be taken in respect of Aboriginal communities. Special leaflets printed in Aboriginal languages, the use of film strips and other educative media may be worth considering.

I would appreciate your views on these matters.
